The Bands of America Honor Band marches in the Rose Parade® in Pasadena, California for the fifth time, on New Year's Day 2022.

The in-person Music for All Summer Symposium returns after two summers paused due to the pandemic.

The BOA Alumni Campaign reaches its fundraising goal of \$250,000, raised in 81 days, prior to Feb. 28, 2009.

Music for All debuts the Middle School National Music Festival.

Gayl Doster named Volunteer of the Year by the International Festival and Events Association.

2008

Gayl and Beverly Doster donate \$100,000—the largest individual gift received by the organization at this time.

Bands of America's Sound Check is the first marching event in the new Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis.

The Grand National Championships are held for the first time at Lucas Oil Stadium.

Music for All is awarded its largest grant to date-\$495,000-from the Lilly Endowment to support implementation of a mature fundraising program.

The Orchestra America National Festival debuts in Hilbert Circle Theatre in cooperation with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra.

INergy, Indy's Official Musical Ambassadors, debuts as a co-production of Bands of America and the Indianapolis Convention and Visitors Association.

Music for All's California research and policy efforts pay off: Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger and the California State Legislature allocate \$500 million as a reinvestment into music and arts education in public schools.

Bands of America Honor Band performs before millions on January 1st in the Rose Parade, with more than 330 outstanding high school band members from across the nation.

Orchestra America, a division of Bands of America, debuts the Honor Orchestra of America at the National Concert Band Festival.

Bands of America and The Cavaliers host a two-day camp in San Antonio, TX.

Music for All Foundation, in partnership with other organizations, works in Arkansas to secure the first legislative mandate for music and arts education for every state.

Music for All Foundation launches Music for All awareness campaign and cause-related product line.

2004

Bands of America and the National Band Association agree to partner to present the NBA conference in conjunction with the Bands of America Summer Symposium.

Music for All Foundation releases *Sound of Silence: The Unprecedented Decline of Music Education in California Public Schools*, documenting the 50% decline in music participation in California Schools.

Bands of America holds first Super Regional in San Antonio, TX, at the Alamodome.

Bands of America opens new headquarters in historic Union Station, downtown Indianapolis, relocating from the Chicagoland area where it was founded.

Bands of America creates the Bands of America Hall of Fame and inducts the inaugural class.

Music for All Foundation is founded with a mission to expand access to music and arts education programs through pioneering research, public policy and advocacy efforts.

2002

Bands of America debuts the Orchestra Division at the Summer Symposium.

The Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra presents a special Bands of America tribute concert at the National Concert Band Festival and National Percussion Festival.

2001

The Bands of America Summer Band Symposium hits enrollment of more than 1,900 student, director, instructor and booster participants.

1999

The Honor Band of America, conducted by H. Robert Reynolds, presents a concert tour of Japan, performing exchange concerts with top Japanese bands.

1998

The Regional Championship schedule expands to 12 events nationwide.

The National Concert Band Festival moves to Indianapolis, IN. Percussion ensembles perform for the first time as part of the National Festival.

The first Bands of America Regional Concert Band Festival is held at the University of North Texas.

Yamaha Corporation of America becomes Bands of America's first National Presenting Sponsor.

1996

Grand Nationals expands to 80 bands—three-day prelims/semi-finals/finals format.

The Regional Championship schedule expands to 10 events nationwide.

The first BOA Express summer camp is held in Texas.

1995

Bands of America website is launched at www.bands.org.

1992

The National Concert Band Festival debuts—a non-competitive performance event for high school concert bands.

The Summer Band Symposium moves to Illinois State University.

1991

The Summer Band Symposium expands to include the World Percussion Symposium.

1990

The Summer Band Symposium expands to include concert band and jazz band.

1989

The final Summer National Championship is held at the Summer Workshop/Festival.

The first Bands of America Marching Percussion Festival is held during Grand National Championships weekend.

1988

The Internal Revenue Service recognizes Bands of America, Inc., as a not-for-profit 501(c)(3) organization, retroactive to 1984 when Bands of America filed for status.

Bands of America is now governed by the laws regarding non-profit organizations by the IRS.

1987

Grand Nationals is held in the Pontiac Silverdome in 1987 & 1988.

1986

The Student Leadership Workshop is added to the Summer Workshop.

1984

Grand Nationals moves to the newly-completed Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis, IN.

1984 marks a major turning point in Bands of America's history. Formerly part of a parent company, "Marching Bands of America" separates to become a new, self-supporting organization renamed "Bands of America, Inc."

On November 15, 1984, Bands of America files for not-for-profit status with the IRS.

Tim Lautzenheiser succeeds Nick Valenziano as executive director.

Bands of America is founded as "Marching Bands of America."

Gary Beckner serves as the first executive director.

Greetings!



The pandemic provided a unique opportunity to partner with an organization that offered pre-recorded, high-quality online music resources (5,000+ video lessons) for students at beginner, intermediate, and advanced levels. Taught by some of the finest educators in the country, these resources provided sequential lessons for woodwind, brass, percussion, music theory, and conducting.

Music for All was proud to connect Indianapolis Public Schools (IPS) with this resource so that IPS instrumental music students could continue learning online from home.

BEHIND THE NUMBERS

In March 2020, the World Health Organization declared a worldwide pandemic due to the outbreak of a novel strain of coronavirus, called COVID-19. The COVID-19 outbreak resulted in a temporary state-wide stay at home order. As a result, Music for All was forced to shut down the March 2020 Music for All National Festival and cancel all events until September 2021. In response to the pandemic, Music for All took immediate action and made difficult decisions to reduce expenses. Music for All continued to advocate for music education by hosting a series of webinars, podcasts, digital education programming and virtual events during the pandemic. These resources continue to be available online, and the most popular series continue with new episodes, topics, and guests.





Industry leaders spoke about the future of music education in a COVID-19 world. Participants heard ideas for solutions and information needed to be successful teaching in the new global landscape. Mind the Gap

This series helps student teachers “mind the gap” between their first classroom experience and student teaching amid COVID-19, and find support through the guidance of a network of mentor music educators. Administrators and music educators from districts around the country make up the panels in each session, covering topics including classroom management, programming with contemporary issues in mind, interviewing, first-year teacher challenges, arts/music advocacy, social emotional learning, and the philosophies of music education. With a Little Help from My Friends

An unscripted live series offering a forum to discuss any topic in a supportive environment. Each episode features a new panel of “friends” (master teachers). Unique to this program is the ability to call-in (radio show style) and engage with our friends live on the air. Premiered on June 15, 2020. Reach: 1,293



Patterns for Success

A 9-week series for student leadership development and Drum Major training, this series ran weekly from April 4, 2020 through May 28, 2020. Reach: 8,659



A-Choir-ing Success

Led by the MFA Choral Education Task Force, this collection of online resources is specially designed for teachers & parents, including all things “vocal” for K-12 singers. Premiered on October 21, 2020. Reach: 2,263



Band Director Hub Live Webinar

These monthly live webinars are led by world-class educators and presented exclusively in the Band Director Hub, powered by BAND, the mobile app. Topics have included Ear Training for Band, Tools for Remote Learning, Festival Preparation for Small or Young Bands, and Advocacy. Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra Conducting Symposium

The course was curated and led by ISO Associate Conductor Jacob Joyce. This seminar covered fundamentals of conducting, from score study techniques to navigating mixed meter. Maestro Joyce led Q&A sessions, breakout rooms for collaborative work, and offered appearances from guest artists.

Summer Sessions & Leadership Lessons


In lieu of a live Summer Symposium at Ball State University, Music for All launched this free resource on June 1, 2020, with an Opening Kickoff, lasting through early September 2020. This was a series of asynchronous videos and e-courses where new material from our world-class faculty was released each week for students and educators. Curriculum included the following areas: Leadership, Concert Band, Orchestra, Drum Major, Color Guard, and Music Production.

Road Map to Strategic Planning

The development of Music for All's Road Map To Strategic Planning resulted from work with the I-65 Corridor Collaborative.

Launched in 2018, Music for All's I-65 Corridor Collaborative is an initiative designed to empower students and teachers to engage in collaborative planning and action to foster support by constructing a model for the advancement of scholastic music-making within core urban school communities along the I-65 Corridor, from Gary, Indiana, to Mobile, Alabama.

The focus for the I-65 Corridor Collaborative is guided by the belief that collaboration between students and teachers is the best method for creating and developing a comprehensive music program that can sustain itself through the support and investment of its most important groups of constituents. When developing strategic plans, students and teachers should collaborate together to create a mission, vision, and core values for their music program to influence goal setting and future decision-making for their programs.

LIVE SHOWCASES

Music for All has been the leader in educational performance opportunities for scholastic music ensembles since 1975. During the pandemic when it was unable to hold in-person events, Music for All designed and executed new programming, continuing to provide positively life-changing experiences for scholastic music ensembles through remote and virtual opportunities.

The Live Showcases provided an opportunity for school ensembles to perform for an appreciative audience and to receive educational feedback. Live Showcases gave performing students, teachers, and parents a Music for All/Bands of America performance experience. They provided a goal-oriented performance moment at a time when many groups had limited places and ways to perform.

Students, parents, and fans from across the country were able to view live performances in real time, with a nominal virtual ticket price.

Ensembles shared their performances by connecting with Music for All to stream a live performance from their campus or other remote venue. Participants were encouraged to embrace any temporary constraints as an opportunity for unique performances, like singers and dancers with percussion ensemble, jazz ensemble with color guard, or mixed instrumentation. Music for All and Bands of America clinicians provided expert feedback to the performing ensembles that selected to receive evaluation.

Our experience with the Music For All Live Showcase was fantastic! It gave all of us at Norwin a chance to experience a "real" show day for the first time this season. This was an incredibly meaningful experience for not only the Norwin Band but the entire Norwin community.



PANDEMIC PIVOT

JOINING US!



At a time when the pandemic limited traditional sources of fundraising and donations, Music for All turned to creative virtual fundraising efforts to connect with donors.

In the fall of 2020, the Bands of America stadium announcers invited Bands of America fans to share their best “BOA Announcer” style. The “Joining Us! BOA Announcer Challenge” drew bands fans submitting their take on BOA’s traditional band introduction announcement: *Joining us!....*

More than 70 citizen announcers submitted their *Joining Us!* entries. A dollar a vote for donors’ favorites resulted in a grand total of \$53,094 raised through this effort.



Video submissions that received the most votes during the preliminary round advanced to Semi-Finals and then again to the Finals round. Nine finalists were featured at the All Together Now Live Pledge Event on November 14, 2020.

Nicholas Costella, an alum and former drum major of the Dobyys-Bennett High School marching band from Johnson City, TN, was named the BOA *Joining Us!* Announcer Challenge Grand Champion. Nick was invited to the 2021 Grand Nationals where he was recognized on field as the first *Joining Us!* Champion.

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MUSIC EDUCATION AND SEL: FINDING IDENTITY, FOSTERING BELONGING, AND AMPLIFYING AGENCY



Scott N. Edgar, Ph.D. is an Associate Professor of Music at Lake Forest College in Lake Forest, Illinois. He is also the Director of Practice and Research for The Center for Arts Education and Social Emotional Learning, and a valued member of the Music for All Educational Team.

The social and emotional challenges our students face on a daily basis can be profound. The typical challenges youth face such as difficulty adapting to change, relationship challenges, and developing a firm sense of identity have always been blatantly obvious to music educators who see their students more than any other teacher in the school. The COVID disruption has exponentially increased the impact of these challenges on our students resulting in a mental health crisis unlike this generation has ever seen. Navigating these challenges requires skill, just as musicians require fundamental skills to apply to musical works. Music

educators have always valued the life skills we teach through music. The changes, current needs of our students have become obvious and our music teachers are looking for tools to help them deepen their ability to connect with their students to explicitly build the skills necessary to confront these profound life challenges. The role of the music teacher goes so much deeper than just teaching notes and rhythms—NEEDS BEFORE NOTES.

We have realized that the student must be at the center of the classroom, not the music. One powerful tool utilized in P-16 education to help teachers build these life skills through music is [Social Emotional Learning \(SEL\)](#). “SEL is the process through which all young people and adults acquire and apply the knowledge, skills, and attitudes to develop healthy identities, manage emotions and achieve personal and collective goals, feel and


show empathy for others, establish and maintain supportive relationships, and make responsible and caring decisions.” (CASEL, 2021). SEL intentionally embedded into the music classroom, has profound potential to build resilience, achieve accurate self-perception, celebrate cultural assets, and amplify student voices to affect meaningful change in the classroom, school, and community. Over the past decade, I have worked to translate SEL for music education (<https://giamusic.com/store/mesel>). The result has been increased awareness to the true potential our music classrooms have to build life skills.

Music for All has always realized the potential for music education to have “positively life-changing experiences.” Utilizing SEL, the resources are now there to make explicit what

we have touted implicitly for decades. The dots have been connected and resources now exist as teachers continue to do this essential work. We have launched a [Teaching Social Emotional Learning Through Music](#) video and podcast series resulting in tens of thousands of viewers/listeners tuning in to see how experts in the field define SEL in their world and find ways to translate it into their practice. Composers, educators, policy makers, and advocates are rallying around the common language of SEL to amplify how we can best meet our students’ needs. Music for All realizes the power of music to meet our students’ needs and through many of these new resources and initiatives, we, together, will help move our students from trauma back to trust, through music.



MARINES

Music for All's sponsors help make our events and programs possible, including our National Presenting Sponsor Yamaha Corporation of America; Official Sponsors Fred J. Miller, Music Travel Consultants, Wenger, and PepWear; and our newest 2020 sponsor, the U.S. Marine Corps.

During the fall, the U.S. Marines performed the national anthem for our Live Showcases. In addition, during each event the Marines were featured during 30-minute pre-show question and answer segments. Gunnery Sergeant James Holt, Staff Sergeant Mardia Timoney, Master Gunnery Sergeant William Call, and Master Gunnery Sergeant William Rulapaugh covered topics like the USMC core values of honor, courage, and commitment. They discussed how these same values are instilled in young people through their participation in school music and how music and arts education are core to a student's complete education.

In addition, they led virtual workshops for communities in Music for All's I-65 Corridor Collaborative titled "Lessons in Leadership: A Marine's Perspective." These workshops covered topics like leadership skills and how to lead, motivate, and work as a team to accomplish a mission; how to set personal goals and master one's instrument; the importance of practice schedules and techniques; the differences in performing with a chamber ensemble; and lessons learned in musical ensembles and how they relate to real life situations.

"It is vitally important for students to see music professionals outside of their music teacher," said music educator John Phillips of Tarrant High School (AL). "Music for All is working to connect students of all backgrounds to the wider world of music and is not just pushing the contests the organization is known for. The leadership is actively listening to students from high poverty areas to help them and their teachers provide the best musical education experience possible."

The virtual events also included performances like the Quantico Marine Corps Band Brass Quintet performing "The Fairest of the Fair" by John Phillip Sousa and "Misty" by Erroll Garner, Sergeant Logan Mueller-Jonas on trumpet performing Sergei Rachmaninov's "Vocalise" Op. 34, no. 10; and the percussion ensemble performing "Cloud Forest" by Blake Tyson.



MUSIC FOR ALL HALL OF FAME 2020 ERIC L. MARTIN

Eric L. Martin is the first inductee into the newly-named Music for All Hall of Fame.

Providing more than 25 years of continuous service, Eric L. Martin was the Chief Executive Officer of Music for All (MFA). Mr. Martin served first on Music for All's Board of Directors, followed by positions as MFA's Associate Executive Director, then Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, until being appointed as CEO in 2010, a role in which he served until April 2020.

During his tenure as Music for All's CEO, Mr. Martin championed initiatives that strengthened the organization's fiscal position, expanded its organizational capacity, and consistently increased the number of students, teachers, and others directly served by Music for All.

Mr. Martin is a member of several Indianapolis and Indiana boards of directors. He is an honors graduate of Dartmouth College. He also holds a Juris Doctor degree from the University of Michigan Law School and has been admitted by exam to the District of Columbia and State of Georgia bar associations.

A Certified Festivals and Events Executive, he is Past Chairman of the Board of Directors of the International Festivals

and Events Association and an inductee into the Miller Brewing Hall of Fame, the highest honor awarded by the International Festivals and Events Association. In August, Mr. Martin received the 2020 Outstanding PAS Supporter Award from the Percussive Arts Society.

Prior to joining Music for All, Mr. Martin earned national event production credits for some of America's largest events, including the 1996 Atlanta Paralympic Games, the World University Games, San Francisco's Chinese New Year Parade, Philadelphia's Bicentennial Parade, and the "Operation Welcome Home" Ticker Tape Parade in New York, celebrating America's victory in the first Persian Gulf War. In 1993, Mr. Martin won a Regional Emmy® for his production of the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Holiday Parade on SuperStation TBS.

A native of Greenville, Mississippi, Mr. Martin participated in instrumental music programs throughout high school and college. In 1971, he was one of the first African Americans inducted into the Greenville High School Hall of Fame.

Music for All's Bands of America Hall of Fame debuted in 2003, recognizing individuals who have had a positively life-changing impact through Music for All and Bands of America programs, as well



as in music education. With Mr. Martin's induction on November 14, the Hall of Fame was renamed the **Music for All Hall of Fame**, signaling a widening to recognize leaders in all areas of scholastic music.

Mr. Martin was recognized as an inductee during an online broadcast, All Together Now!, a live pledge event benefitting Music for All's educational programs. The live pledge event took place on November 14, on what would have been the evening of the Bands of America Grand National Championships Finals in Lucas Oil Stadium.

Patrick J. Burley



Patrick Burley is President and Chief Executive Officer of Meridian Investment Advisors, Inc. of Indianapolis, IN. Mr. Burley serves on the Board of Directors for Music for All and as Chair of the Finance Committee. Music for All's board member responsibilities include shaping and reviewing the mission and programs; selecting the Chief Executive Officer; providing financial oversight; and ensuring legal and ethical integrity and accountability.

Over the years, Mr. Burley has been able to use his professional skills to assist a wide variety of community non-profits. Darrin Davis



Darrin Davis currently serves as the Director of Bands and Assistant Director of Fine Arts for the Broken Arrow school district. He has taught band in the district since 1993. Davis is the conductor of the nationally acclaimed Broken Arrow High School Wind Ensemble and director of the Pride of Broken Arrow Marching Band, Bands of America's Grand National Champion in 2006, 2011, 2015, and 2021. He is also a

member of Music for All's marching advisory committee. Davis' band has marched in the Tournament of Roses Parade three times. The Broken Arrow Marching Band has been presented multiple times with the Sudler Shield. In March of 2017, Davis was elected into the membership of the prestigious American Bandmasters Association.

John Casagrande



John E. Casagrande served as Executive Administrator for the National Band Association from 1982 to 2000. He served as Director of Bands for a number of high schools before joining the faculty of George Mason University in the fall of 1997 as an adjunct professor of music. He was promoted to a professor of music in 2002 and retired from that position in 2010. Mr. Casagrande was a long-time clinician and evaluator for Music for All.

He received both his Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Ithaca College. His honors include election to the American Bandmasters Association, the American School Band Directors Association, and the Sudler Flag of Honor. John Casagrande was born January 30, 1942, and passed away July 8, 2019.

Philip Geiger



Philip Geiger spent 23 years as Director of Bands at Westfield High School. While at Westfield, his bands were recognized nationally; the marching band was the 2003 Bands of America Grand National Champion and the concert bands performed several times at the Bands of America National Concert Band Festival. The Westfield Band was a consistent finalist in the TMEA Honor Band Competition and the Symphonic Band earned the

distinction of being twice selected as the TMEA Honor Band. Concert bands under his direction have received both the Sudler Shield and Sudler Flag. Mr. Geiger is a 1975 graduate of Southern Methodist University. In 2000, Mr. Geiger was recognized by the Texas Bandmasters Association with their inaugural Meritorious Achievement Award.
